Grading – Grades are based off your total points.

Homework: Homework will be given on a regular basis. Assignments that are reviewed in class cannot be made up later. Other assignments can be made up for a grade of no more than 50%

Quizzes: Quizzes will be given regularly. Quizzes will consist of 10 to 20 questions. Each question will be worth 2 points. Students will only have one week to make up their work.

Tests – There will be a test at the end of every unit. Tests will be worth 50 to 100 points. Students will not be allowed to do test corrections.

Essays – Students will be given essays on a regular basis. Essays will be worth 25 to 50 points. Essays can be rewritten for a higher grade.

Class Work – Students will have 5 to 10 points of classwork every day. Most class work will be done on Schoology so students can do it if they are absent.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS – An assignment is considered to be late if it is not handed in by 3:00 the day it is assigned. Assignments handed in late will receive no more than 50%.
